Brilliant Year 11 student Tom Garlick recalled over 400 digits which is massively impressive, but still short of his personal best of well over 500. Now he aims for Oxford or Cambridge University and to be a world-class physicist.

His feat is even more remarkable considering doctors say he has an Arachnoid Cyst on the right hand side of the brain. It means he has to inject himself



once a day with a growth hormone.

Good Samaritan WCSA students have been highly commended after helping a lady in distress for three hours.



Two visionary health centres have joined forces to inspire children across Weston and Worle to do even more sport outside of school.

World health experts along with Prince Harry and others have warned that children are increasingly getting addicted to Fortnite and other video games. Now the Paula Radcliffe Fitness Centre (PRC) based at PCSA, and Hutton Moor Leisure Centre, are giving free gym and swim sessions to boost fitness, health and mental well-being. Priory and Worle students are encouraged to do sports during school and in Period 6 activities - and now both health centres are working together to inspire more sport and health in the evenings and weekends.

Hutton Moor Leisure Centre is offering a free swim for any child aged 4 to 15 if they cut out the voucher at the front of The Post and hand it in.

Head of PRC Vanessa Mawford said: "Students aged 11 to 15 need simply to get a signed sports pass from their Head of Year and we will give them free passes for evenings until 4.30pm and weekends 10am - 12 noon.

"Sport and exercise are vital for health and mental well-being, with positive knock on effects into other areas."
